## Launch of the 2015 RCMRD Work Plan

The Regional Centre for Mapping of Resources for Development (RCMRD) launched its 2015 Work Plan in a ceremony held at the Centre. The 2015 Work Plan was officially launched by Dr. Hussein Farah, Director General, on behalf of the management and in the presence of all staff.

The 2015 Work Plan is the first annual plan for the implementation of the Centre's new four year Strategic Plan 2015-2018 that was approved by the Conference of Ministers in November 2014.

The Strategic Plan was developed in the context of national, regional and international environments and development initiatives, to position RCMRD to practically respond to the opportunities it presents.

The Work Plan gives details of the activities that will be carried out by the Centre in 2015.

These activities include training and capacity building, project and advisory services, data provision, repair of surveying equipment, and research.

These activities are expected to contribute to interventions aimed at dealing with the development challenges facing the Centre's member States.

The Director General held a brief meeting with the Experts at the Centre's boardroom, where he gave a brief presentation on RCMRD's History, Member Countries, Vision, Mission and Services.

Thereafter, the group went to a number of project rooms including the SERVIR room,



Green House Gas Inventory Project room, Data office, AMESD/MESA Project room, Remote Sensing Laboratory, among others.

The MESA Technical Experts visit to RCMRD was in line with the ongoing 4th MESA Technical Experts Meeting, which started on the 19th of January, 2015.

## RCMRD Helping Malawi Respond to Ongoing Floods

The Regional Center for Mapping of Resources for Development (RCMRD) hosting the SERVIR East & Southern Africa hub, partnered with NASA to help the government of Malawi respond to the flood situation.

The Department of Surveys in Malawi together with the Department of Disaster Management (DoDMA)

requested RCMRD to help them access satellite imagery and analysis to assess damage and plan response, including evacuation.

## RCMRD's Partnership with the UNSPIDER as a Regional Support Office

The Regional Centre for Mapping of Resources for Development (RCMRD) has been at the forefront of promoting the use of geospatial technologies for Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) in Africa.

RCMRD in collaboration with NASA SERVIR has developed a comprehensive DRR framework which stipulates the principles and rationale of the center's engagement in the region in disaster management including the procedures for

identifying projects to implement in the member states and strategic partnerships with development partners and collaborators working in the region.

Amongst many of these partnerships is RCMRD's role as a UNSPIDER Regional Support Office (RSO). This partnership has been operational for several years now and among the activities jointly implemented under the partnership

is capacity building for experts in institutions in member states who are involved in different aspects of disaster management including early warning, response, mitigation as well as capacity building to experts at RCMRD involved in disaster management projects through participation in international conferences and training workshops. The Regional Centre for Mapping of Resources for Development (RCMRD) is currently involved in an ambitious project for Assessment and Training on Land and Land Related Fields for 4,800 employees of the Ministry of Urban Development, Housing and Construction (MUHCo), the Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia.

The Assessment and Training is being carried out in four centers including; Bahir Dar, Hawassa, Adigrat and Ambo.

RCMRD's Dr. Rwiza (the Project Manager) hosted a dinner for the local and international assessors in Ambo in honor of the ongoing activity.

The project is anticipated to be completely implemented in two

The objective behind SERVIR's active capacity building is to strengthen the ability of Governments and other key stakeholders to integrate Earth observation information and geospatial technologies into development decision making.

SERVIR-Eastern and Southern Africa's capacity building projects are targeted towards experts in GIS and remote sensing and people in this field within RCMRD member states.

Government officials along with representative institutions within the industry are invited to participate in workshops associated with

## Data Dissemination and Technical Training in Malawi

The main objective of the two-day training and single-day data dissemination was to enlighten the participants of the methodology used in developing land cover maps.

RCMRD has been dedicated to sharing the relevant data using all available means developed for Malawi through the “Land Cover Mapping for GHG project”.

Dr. Farah explained the important role of RCMRD in this Project, which is implementing land degradation assessment, natural habitat conservation, and forest monitoring

in the Intergovernmental Authority on Development region including Djibouti, Ethiopia, Kenya, Somalia, Sudan, South Sudan, Uganda, Eritrea, Burundi, and Rwanda.

The Regional Centre for Mapping of Resources for Development is implementing Land Degradation Service in the IGAD (Intergovernmental Authority on Development) region through the MESA project.

During the workshop, experts from

the Centre presented methodology and products generated using the Land degradation model.

The overall objective of the service is to guide policy and decision makers to understand the trend of land degradation and concentrate efforts on areas worst at risk.

## RCMRD Staff and Management Support Malawi Floods Victims

Massive flooding occurred in Malawi in the month of January, 2015, the most serious flooding disaster in the Nation's history. The Regional Centre for Mapping of Resources for Development and its staff contributed Ksh. 200,000 an equivalent of USD 2,500 towards the effort.
